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

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
# Choose Your Adventure
















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# Chilton By Amelia Compton Wolff hilton has the "rural cool" thing down pat and it doesn't even know it. Natural beauty, salt of the earth people and an unhurried pace to locals, it's just everyday life. To everyone else, it's an act of rebellion. From time to time, it's thrilling to trade city lights for something less obvious. Nature abounds in Chilton. The area offers familyfocused outdoor fun for every season, from a renowned nature center to a drive-in movie theater. Foodies will have fun too. With a population of just under 4,000, Chilton is the Calumet County seat and in the heart of the official "Supper Club Capital of the Midwest." (Unofficially, that also makes it the Old Fashioned Capital of Wisconsin.) #### RECREATION

#### **Adventure Awaits**

Looking for an adrenaline rush? Gravity Park USA offers weekly competitive bike and ATV racing from April through October. Stop by on Friday night for the actionpacked Dirtgrinder Series competition and Killsnake Clubhouse's famous fish fry. With a bird's eye view of the race track, the clubhouse offers free spectator admission.



Just five miles east of Chilton is the Killsnake Wildlife Area. Here, birders can view sandhill cranes and bobolinks in summer and shorteared owls and rough-legged hawks in winter. Hikers can walk for hundreds of yards amongst the prairie grasslands. From canoeing the Manitowoc River to gathering wild edibles, the 7,000-acre wildlife area offers a bounty of recreational opportunities.



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Golfers will want to schedule a tee time at Hickory Hills Country Club. This 18-hole golf course is open to the public and a favorite of locals and visitors. Make sure to check out the Friday fish fry served June through August and the haunted Halloween golf cart rides in October. Another family-friendly option is to throw some discs at Chilton Elementary School's 9-hole disc golf course.

#### **Top 5 Ledge View Nature Center Must-Dos**

This 105-acre nature center offers everything from educational programs to cave tours.

#### 1: Explore a cave.

Get dirty on a tour of Ledge View's underground bedrock caves, formed by ancient groundwater and glacial meltwater. Guided tours are available spring through fall. Reservations recommended. Mark your calendar for the kid-friendly Halloween candlelight tours scheduled October 20-21 from 5:30-8:30pm.



This 60-foot observation tower offers panoramic views of the Chilton countryside.

#### 3: Visit the bat barn.

There are several interactive activities inside the center's exhibit hall including the bat barn featuring live bats and an exhibit with live young lake sturgeon.



#### 4: Hike the quarry overlook.

There are two miles of hiking trails and this overlook provides a great view of the dolostone quarry located on the property.

#### 5: Celebrate maple syrup.

Tap a maple tree, collect sap, learn the history of syrup and try some on pancakes during Maple Syrup Sunday in March, the grand finale to the maple syruping season.



#### Fun on the Farm

Agri-tourists have lots to love in Chilton

> No fishing license? No problem. Spend a day reeling in perch and bluegill at Evergreen Valley Fish Farm, no license necessary. The farm, located near Chilton, has three man-made ponds offering fishermen and women of all abilities the



chance to catch a fish. Keep the fish you hook for a per pound fee or catch and release. Evergreen Valley Fish Farm is open by reservation only so call ahead to make an appointment.

For visitors looking for produce, each season brings something new to Meuer Farm. In June and July, guests can head out to the fields and pick their own strawberries and peas. The farm's pick-your-own pumpkin patch is open mid-September through October, as is the epic 10-acre corn maze in two phases. The farm also hosts food and art events, including a summer dinner series that includes a cash bar, four-course dinner prepared by a local restaurant and farm presentation. Check out their website for dates.



Fall is a great time to visit Chilton, particularly Heritage Orchard, open late summer



through fall. Located about 10 miles west of Chilton overlooking Lake Winnebago, the orchard offers dozens of apple varieties for picking. Visit the farm market for freshly picked apples, pumpkins, squash, award-winning apple cider and apple cider donuts. Select your treats and head out to Hawthorne Hollow for a picnic.

Don't let the name fool you - Polly's Pumpkin Patch offers much more than pumpkins. From pick-your-own strawberries in June to pre-picked blueberries in August, visitors will find the freshest summer berries alongside homegrown vegetables, cheese curds and baked goods in the farm market store. In fall, guests can weave their way through the 15-acre corn maze, test out the 40-foot slide or play a game of pumpkin bowling.



#### SEVEN WAYS TO PLAY IN CHILTON

#### 1: Go to an outdoor movie.

Take in a double feature under the stars at Chilton Twilight Drive-In Theater. Arrive early to squeeze in a round of mini golf before the show. Open Wednesday through Sunday during the summer.

#### 2: Step back in time.

Calumet The County Historical Society Museum is located in Chilton and has

many items from the area's past on display including antique machinery, old cars, photographs and more. Open Sundays 1-4pm, June through September. Free admission.

#### 3: Stroll the riverwalk.

This ¼ mile paved trail hugs the South Branch of the Manitowoc River and provides a rare moment of quiet within an urban setting. The best access to the riverwalk is located at the Chilton Public Library.

#### 4: Taste cheese at Vern's.

Vern's Cheese has been a fixture in Chilton since 1964. Their specialty shop has everything you need for a proper picnic, from cured meats and crackers to local wine and beer. Of course, there is plenty of cheese to sample as well.

#### Rummage Queen

There's a 24/7 rummage sale located in a storefront on Chilton's main drag for those midnight shopping cravings. Operated by Rowland's Calumet Brewing Co. Owner Pat Rowland, the store is rather unassuming from the street. Inside the unmanned store, it looks like a thrift store that runs on the honor system (but there are security cameras, so no funny business). Several dozen local families contribute to the sale with items like clothing, household essentials and decor. Simply document your purchase by placing the item's tag in a binder and place your money in the locked cash box. You might not find any family heirlooms, but the novelty alone is worth a stop.



#### 5: Pick up some local produce.

The Chilton Farmers Market runs Fridays, June 16-October 27 from 11am to 4pm at the Chilton Eagles Club. Swing by the freshest seasonal produce and locally made goods, which make perfect souvenirs from your visit.

#### 6: Visit a winery.

Quinney Estate Winery, located west of Chilton near Lake Winnebago, is a familyowned, 5-acre winery and vineyard that produces small batch wines from grapes grown



onsite. The winery focuses on three wines per year and the Marquette Reserve has won


awards at the San Diego International Sommelier Challenge over the past three consecutive years. The winery is open by appointment only so call ahead to arrange a tour.

#### 7: Enjoy live music.

The Thursday Night Concert Series at Hobart Park runs through August 10. Some locals prefer to watch the music from their vehicles parked on the green space in front of the bandstand. To show the musicians your appreciation after a song, honk your horn and flash your lights.

#### DINING

#### Supper Club Capital of the Midwest

Chilton sits smack dab in the middle of Calumet County, otherwise known as the "Supper Club Capital of the

Midwest." Many of the county's small communities were settled by Catholic Germans in the mid-1800s. These settlers established churches first and then communities, including social gathering places, cropped up around them. These social dinner establishments that are unique to the Upper




Midwest became known as supper clubs. Just south of Chilton is one such establishment that has roots dating back to the 19th century, Roepke's Village Inn. Today the supper club serves hand-cut steaks, German entrees and seafood. Roepke's is especially famous for its Friday night fish fry and extensive salad bar, which is a meal on its own. A trip to Chilton would not be complete without at least one supper club stop and Roepke's is a local favorite.

#### **Local Brews:**

#### Rowland's Calumet Brewing Co.

Rowland's Calumet Brewing Co. has been brewing craft beer since before hipsters wore skinny jeans. Today it is Chilton's only microbrew pub, but it follows in the footsteps of a long



brewing history in Calumet County. The former Calumet Brewing Company, one of several now defunct breweries in Chilton, was the last to close its doors in 1942 after nearly nine decades in business. Fortyeight years later, Bob Rowland opened Rowland's Calumet Brewing Co. in 1990, naming it in tribute to Chilton's last operating

brewery. The brewery produced 80 barrels of beer its first year and has continued to grow. In 2006, Bob's son, Pat, took over operations and today it is a must-stop during any visit to Chilton. Try the Fat Man's Nut Brown Ale, with rich, roasted nut notes, or the moderately hopped Calumet Amber with a sweet caramel malt flavor. The brewery also offers homemade root beer for non-imbibers.

#### **Dining To-Do List**

These eateries will keep you fueled from morning to night

#### **Breakfast**

Start your morning with an organic coffee at Terra Verde Coffeehouse. For sustenance, try the Norwegian bagel with salmon lox, tomatoes, marinated onions and cream cheese, or customize your own egg bowl with meats, cheeses and veggies. You can even pick up a growler of iced coffee, tea or kombucha for the road. Lupita's Bar & Grill is another great breakfast option. They open at 8am everyday and serve up Mexican breakfast dishes like huevos rancheros and chilaquiles. Top it off with a glass of



horchata or a fresh fruit smoothie and you're ready for a day on the town.

For an easy grab-and-go lunch, hit up Hilde's Deli & Bakery. Choose from sandwiches and salads made daily or have them whip up one on the



spot. Hilde's also offers hot options each day such as broasted chicken and fish. Feeding a crowd? Consider the homemade pizza, particularly the 30-inch BAP (which stands for Big Appetizing Pizza). It's legendary. Pla-Mor Lanes offers a large menu and the grilled salmon sandwich comes highly recommended by Chilton Chamber of Commerce

President and former chef Pat Rowland, who usually orders two at a time. Ethel's Pub & Grill serves up a large selection of creative burgers, including the Ethel Burger - a bacon cheeseburger topped with fried onions, chipotle BBQ sauce and onion rings.

Pete's Fisherman's Inn has a bacon burger that is made with local meat from Pipe Meat Market with bacon ground into the burger. In Rowland's words, it's "the bomb." He recommends trying it topped with fried onions and cheese and a side of sour cream fries. If you're traveling with a group,

Papa Don's Pizzeria & Buffet is perfect for parties and picky eaters. From soup and salad to pizza and chicken, this buffet offers something for everyone.

Scoops Ice Cream House is the cherry on top of a great day in Chilton. Choose from the "Sweet 16" lineup, flavors that are always on standby like salted caramel, mint chip and blue moon. Eight rotating seasonal flavors, like pistachio almond and s'mores, round out the offerings.

#### Sauerkraut Festival

August 5-6

It's no surprise that you can find a Sauerkraut Festival in northern Wisconsin. Drive on up for Polka, games, crafts, car shows and other activities that celebrate the quintessential Wisconsin experience. 8pm-12am, St. Mary's Church, Bear Creek (seven miles south of Clintonville).



#### Firemen's Festival

August 11-12

The Seagrave Fire Apparatus plant is just one of many connections between Clintonville and their firefighters, all of which are in attendance at their annual Firemen's Festival. The festival kicks off with a parade of local community leaders, bands, and (naturally) the wide array of fire trucks in the town. The rest of the festival features games, music, activities for the kids and the perfect solution to the dog days of summer water fights. Friday, 5pm-12am and Saturday, 11am-12am, Olen Park.

#### Fall Frenzy September 16

Fall Frenzy is one of the best ways to see the community of Clintonville out in full force,



with children's activities, great food, crafting tables and music performances bringing out visitors of all ages. 10am-3pm, downtown Clintonville

#### **Five Must-See Spots**

Appreciate the beauty of the great outdoors and learn about the rich history of technological innovation at these attractions.

#### 1: Four Wheel Drive Museum

It's no surprise that the birthplace of fourwheel drive technology would have its own museum, but Badger Four-Wheel Drive Auto Company (now known as Four Wheel Drive) has maintained its museum remarkably well over the years. The museum chronicles the development of four-wheel drive and its growth in the industry while displaying many makes of the first cars to use four-wheel drive in the country. The museum is open Saturdays from 1-4pm until September.



#### 2: Arbor View Gardens

Arbor View Gardens has been a work in the making since 1975, inspired by a love of gardening and a deep interest in the variety of plants capable of growing in Wisconsin. The 35-acre botanical garden features more than 1,000 species of non-invasive plants and officially opened to the public in 2000. The gardens continue to flourish today, thanks to methodical record-keeping and continued support from visitors. It's hard to beat the beauty of hundreds of plants in full bloom. Open Wednesday-Sunday from 10am-4pm.

#### 3: Blueberry Haven

The seeds of Blueberry Haven were first planted in 2002. Now, the family-owned business has over 15,000 Highbush blueberry plants available for picking from mid-July through August (or until the berries run out!). Blueberry Haven allows you to pick your own berries, or you can buy the prepicked blueberries, ready to be made into pies, smoothies, muffins, or just eaten one by one until you're coming back for more. Open Tuesday-SSaturday from 7am-1pm.

#### 4: Glendale Farms

Glendale Farms and Blueberry Haven are a match made in heaven. Glendale Farms is also located just outside of Clintonville, offering PYO (Pick Your Own) strawberries, peas and beans. The family-owned farm has existed in its present location since 1893 and began growing strawberries in 1978. If the drive up to Clintonville has you too tired for picking your own berries, Glendale Farms also offers pre-picked berries. Open Monday-Thursday from 7am-7pm and Friday-Sunday from 7am-5pm.

#### 5: Great Wall of China

Who would've thought you could find the Great Wall of China right in Clintonville? According to legend, the town has the unique honor of being the only place in the world outside of China to host a section of the wall. The section was given to the community by Sun-Yat Sen due to Four Wheel Drive's innovations in engineering. Visit Pioneer Park to see it in addition to one of the most unique collections of stones in the state.





#### History of North Central Airlines

North Central Airlines may be relatively unknown today, but it was once one of the largest airlines in the nation. Founded in 1944 with just two planes flying out of Clintonville, the company continued to grow until it flew more than 56 aircraft to over 100 destinations across the United States. The airline's most

iconic craft was the DC-3, used from 1951 to 1969. In 1958, the number of DC-3s in the North Central Airlines fleet grew to 32, passing every other airline in the country. So what happened to North Central Airlines? It eventually followed in the footsteps of many other airlines around the country and consolidated into Delta Airlines in 1978. Although the name may have changed, you can still find the history of one of Wisconsin's largest airlines in Clintonville today

#### THREE TOP-NOTCH PARKS

Nothing beats sitting back and relaxing in some of Clintonville's most well-known parks situated along the Pigeon River.

#### Olen Park

Olen Park has recreation options for everyone, ranging from summer classics like disc golfing, baseball, tennis and basketball to wintry pursuits like ice skating. The park is just one block away from Main Street and serves as home to the Clintonville A's, Clintonville's amateur baseball team. Olen Park is the heart of a thriving Parks and Recreation program, featuring 15 different park facilities within the town's boundaries.

#### Pigeon Lake


Pigeon Lake makes up a large majority of Clintonville's eastern border, feeding into the Pigeon River cutting through the middle of town. The lake is ideal for the casual fan of fishing, with a wide variety of fish and beautiful views of the adjacent Riverside Golf Course. The lake's close proximity to the town's boundaries allows for casual fishing without taking up the entire day with long stretches of travel.

#### **Picnic Point**

Picnic Point was given its name for a reason: the park's well-kept grounds outlook over Pigeon Lake have made it an ideal picnicking destination. The park offers a hiking trail from the lake to points along the Pigeon River and connects with the Pickerel Point Neighborhood Playground. The Point's western-facing location makes it the perfect place to watch the sunset reflecting off the gentle waters of Pigeon Lake.

#### Worth the Dine

Chow down on Clintonville's specialties at the diners you don't want to miss.

#### Cindy B's Pub and Grill

Looking for a local favorite with that hometown atmosphere? Cindy B's is the place to go. Run by Cindy B herself, the Pub and Grill offers classic drinks and dining options with fantastic weekly specials. Cindy B's is a must-stop for authentic Clintonville cuisine and fantastic service.

#### Schultz's Bluebird Cafe

Schultz's Bluebird Cafe has irresistible options for breakfast and lunch, offering classic breakfast dishes with serious authenticity. Schultz's is the real deal: a diner surviving through the years while other restaurants can only imitate its charming appeal. Schultz's offers homemade donuts, buns and pies and is known for its hometown hospitality. Even if you can only spend a few hours in Clintonville, Schultz's is well worth the visit.



#### Big Sal and Cheesy's Pizza

Big Sal and Cheesy's isn't your average restaurant. This hidden gem specializes in pizza (with monsters like The Big Cheesy Supreme), but it offers many other dishes that are just

as good. From burgers to breakfast staples to wings and appetizers, Big Sal and Cheesy's Pizza will make you feel right at home.

#### The Living Room Coffeeshop

The Living Room is your classic coffeeshop, replete with caffeine and comfy couches. The family-owned shop began as little more than a dream 10 years ago, but has since become one of the most beloved shops in the area. The Living Room also offers unique gifts perfect for summer visitors.



#### Meal You'll Remember

Looking for a challenge? Head on over to The Bear's Den, a sports bar with serious burgers. The most ambitious visitors will want to test their eating abilities with The Towering Kodiak burger, a sandwich with two half-pound patties, three third-pound patties and two brat patties along with bacon, cheese, mushrooms and onions. The burger is topped off with bacon-stuffed cheese blocks, pushing the weight of the sandwich over the three-pound mark. The Towering Kodiak is not for the faint of heart, literally or figuratively.




# Oconto

Conto's fresh forest air and breathtaking views of Lake Michigan capture the essence of Wisconsin's northern communities. The small town takes its name from the Oconto River, a tributary of Lake Michigan that weaves through the downtown district and much of Oconto county.

The city of Oconto was incorporated in 1869 during Wisconsin's 19th century logging boom. The area's history stretches even further back than that, as Oconto and its neighboring communities have been inhabited by the Menominee tribe and their ancestors since 5000-6000 BCE. Centuries after the first traces of civilization began in Oconto, the city witnessed an event that seemed decidedly biblical: in 1952, 175 million leopard frogs emerged from local marshes and swarmed the town after Lake Michigan flooded and elevated the water levels in nearby wetlands. Fortunately for the town and visitors alike, the frogs no longer inhabit the town, making a trip to Oconto fantastic and frog-free. Today, Oconto's lasting connection with nature and its proximity to Lake Michigan allow visitors to spend their time enjoying beautiful parks and outdoor events. The area also features hundreds of miles of ATV and snowmobile trails for those who'd like to experience Oconto's natural surroundings at a faster pace.










#### Oconto's History, Brick by Brick


There is all kinds of history in Oconto, but two architectural beauties stand out. It's not uncommon to see churches sprawling across various Main Street communities in the Midwest, but they're rarely the first church of their kind.



Oconto is home to the first church built exclusively for worship by the First Church of Christ, Scientist—not to be confused with Scientology-and was just the second church built by the denomination in the country. The gothic building dates back to 1886 and the interior is largely unchanged since its original construction. The building was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1974 and remains in use to this day.

Built in 1868, the Beyer Home Museum is one of the oldest remaining buildings in Oconto. The property spans a full block and is home to other historic buildings like the George E Hall Annex and a historic, carefully restored log cabin from Wisconsin's earlier days. The Annex features several exhibits relating to the general history of Oconto County, including a history of nearby rivers and their role in shaping the community along with two vintage electric cars. One of the newest openings on the historic lot is the Carriage House, housing various artifacts that might have gone unnoticed if not for the meticulous attention of the historical society. The Carriage House

opened in 2016 and offers tours during the Beyer Home's normal hours. The next fact may give anyone with a mortgage a serious case of heartburn: when the expansive Beyer Home was put up for sale in 1878, was eventually purchased for \$568. The museum is open 12-4pm every day through Labor Day.









#### RECREATION

#### A Day Outdoors, Four Ways

Whether you're the consummate outdoorsman or just have a soft spot for historic city districts, Oconto is the perfect place to be on a sunny day.

#### 1: Take a stroll through downtown Oconto

As one of the logging communities that popped up in Wisconsin during the 19th century, Oconto has deep ties to Victorian architecture of the 1850s. The Victorian style is not identical from house to house, however, and Oconto's self-guided walking tour allows the curious visitor to enjoy the unique stylings of 33 houses and other structures in the downtown area. Brochures for the walking tour can be obtained at the Oconto Visitor Center.



#### 2: Relax on the lake

If you'd rather spend the day on the water, head over to Breakwater Park along Lake Michigan. With over 50 boat slips available for rent, Breakwater Park is the ideal destination for anyone hoping to spend the day under the sun, listening to the rhythmic rush of waves against the hull.

#### 3: Hike through the forest

It's easy to forget how fortunate we are to live near the abundant wilderness of northern Wisconsin, spanning miles upon miles and bringing new life to the air from seemingly endless forests. (A day or two in Nebraska will quickly remind you how fortunate we really

are.) One of the largest expanses of forest in Wisconsin is the Nicolet National Forest, extending down to the areas northwest of Oconto. The national forest is home to the Cathedral of Pines, a swath of trees that miraculously survived Wisconsin's logging boom and date back to the 1600s.



#### 4: Watch wildlife at the marsh

The area immediately surrounding Oconto is abundant with natural areas. One such area is the Oconto Marsh, a 928-acre wetland area with hundreds of different native species. The marsh is ideal for amateur ornithologists, housing species ranging from bald eagles and loons to snowy owls and great blue herons. The marsh has been preserved for decades, allowing it to retain its uninhibited majesty.





#### Hometown Q&A

Caroline Imig is the mastermind behind Wayne's Family Restaurant's pies, winning more than 20 blue ribbons at the National Pie Championships in the past seven years. She won a blue ribbon for her Nut Pie at the 2017 Championships in Orlando.



#### How did you get your start making pies for Wayne's?

I've been a farmer all my life, and my husband was killed on the farm. I saw the restaurant had an ad for a pie-maker and I thought, "Oh, I can do that, I bake pies a lot at home." I applied here, and I've been baking pies here now for about eight and a half years. The last seven

years, I've been going to the national pie championships. It has pie bakers from all over the country and Canada. I have 25 national championships so far.

#### Do you think the pies have become a bigger part of the community as you've become more successful?

Yes, I think so. The restaurant has become very popular for the pies. We get a lot tour buses here and about once a month we get a pie bus, where they come just for the pie. It's been exciting, I've enjoyed it very much. I love my work.

#### Do you have a favorite type of pie?

You know, I bake a lot of different pies, but I try to go by the seasons. Apple, lemon meringue, caramel apple and cherry are popular year-round of course. We also make a lot of different crème pies. I make over 100 different kinds of pies, but no, I don't think I have a favorite.

#### What's one of your favorite parts about the National Pie Championships?

There's one part of the competition where you have to create your own pie. It can't be anything that's been published, so that's always kind of interesting (laughs).

Head over to The Dockside, located near Breakwater



Park. The restaurant specializes in fresh seafood but carries options for all tastes. The Dockside is a great option for any visitors looking to end the day with a great meal along the shores of Lake Michigan.

#### First-Class Dessert and Dining

Wayne's Family Restaurant looks relatively unassuming at first glance; the restaurant, built in the style of a low-slung farmhouse, fits in with the pastoral landscapes of rural Wisconsin. Don't let appearances fool you, because a trip to Oconto without a stop at Wayne's is nothing short of

heartbreaking. More than 1,000 local residents voted in Oconto's annual Restaurant Week Celebration, selecting Wayne's as their favorite place in town.

The restaurant features classic entrees, salads and breakfast favorites, but anyone from the area can tell you that Wayne's is known for its blue-ribbon pies. That description isn't an exaggeration: Wayne's has won nearly two dozen blue ribbons at the National Pie Championships in Orlando, Florida. Without a doubt, a pie from Wayne's is the

perfect souvenir to bring back from Oconto.

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
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
# Sheboygan Falls

Cheboygan Falls was originally founded in 1835 as the town of Rochester, an industrial settlement centered around three rivers: Sheboygan, Mullet and Onion. The town changed its name to Sheboygan Falls — the rivers kept their names — and has maintained its early history while continuing to move forward today.

> The Historic Downtown District, centered around the intersection of Broadway and Monroe Streets, is a vibrant community built from a wide variety of architectural styles. The area was one of the inaugural communities chosen by the Wisconsin Main Street Revitalization Program, an initiative founded in 1980 to bring back the history of Wisconsin communities. The district was a winner of the "Great American Main Street Award" in 1995, a prestigious award given to just three communities in the country every year.

> > One event in Sheboygan Falls is so significant, it's worth marking your calendar a year in advance: the annual Ducktona 500, an all-day festival held on the first Sunday of July featuring music, activities and a massive rubber duck race. Sheboygan Falls has a little bit of everything for the curious tourist, whether it's golf, historic inns or fantastic restaurants.

Built in 1848, the inn was once Sheboygan County's only post office and was later repurposed as Sheboygan Falls' general store. Rochester Inn's Greek Revival architecture and its signature two-story suites will bring you back to the period when Wisconsin was one of the newest states in the country. For the traveler who plans to spend their mornings driving and putting, there's no better option than The Fringe, a spacious, four-room converted carriage house originally built in 1922. The family-owned inn is near Sheboygan Falls' own golf course, making for an easy commute to the greens.



#### Selfie Spot: Settler's Park

Located along the banks of the Sheboygan River, Settler's Park was built in 2001 making it the newest park in Sheboygan Falls. 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

#### Waushara County Historical Society Museum

The Museum is located in the former Waushara County jail built in 1908. The sheriff and his family lived in the front portion of the house



and prisoners were held in jail cells in the back. In addition to American Indian artifacts, historical photos and memorabilia, the museum offers a bit of macabre local history. Visitors can stand in the cell where notorious serial killer Ed Gein spent the night after his 1957 arrest and see several rifles that were recovered from Gein's kitchen. Stop in for a guided tour Wednesday 9am – 4pm or Thursday 9am – 12pm Saturday hours are being determined, so call ahead to confirm.



### McComb/Bruchs Performing Arts Center

From bluegrass and country to big band orchestras and acoustic quartets, the McComb/Bruchs Performing Arts Center hosts a variety of music and dance programs each season from September through May. The 2017–18 season showcases national and international acts including Firefall, Terry Barber, The Cowsills and Ball in the House.

#### **Black Hawk Folk Society**

#### **Old-School Eateries**







## BEERECIPES

When preparing BBQ ribs, the sunset shores of Hawaii seldom come to mind, but Chef Peter Kuenzi, owner of Zuppas Café & Catering, 1540 S. Commercial St., Neenah, adds a unique tropical twist to this southern staple with Kona Brewing Company's Big Wave Golden Ale.

Kuenzi says beer can serve as a substitute for liquid in cooking as it is more complex than water or stock, but adds flavor. "The beer adds liquid to this recipe that steams or simmers the ribs slowly and makes them tender," said Kuenzi. "Big Wave's tropical hop aroma adds flavor which works well with the pork in this recipe, he added.

#### BIG WAVE GOLDEN ALE PERFECT BABY BACK RIBS

#### Ingredients

- 2 lbs baby back pork ribs
- 2 tsp kosher salt
- 1 tsp smoked paprika
- 1 tsp sweet paprika
- 1 tsp onion powder
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp game powder
- 1/4 tsp freshly ground black pepper
- Dash of cayenne pepper
- 2 racks of ribs
- 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar
- 2 bottles Kona Brewing Company Big Wave Golden Ale
- 1 cup BBQ sauce
- One large slow cooker (at least 6 qts)

#### Instructions

For the dry rub: Place salt, paprika, onion powder, garlic powder, cumin, black pepper and cayenne in small bowl. Mix until blended.

Sprinkle ribs with vinegar and rub into the flesh. Rub the dry rub mixture all over ribs. This may be done the night before for extra flavor.

Spray the insert of a large slow cooker with non-stick spray. Pour the Big Wave Golden Ale into the bottom of the insert pan. Place the ribs in the insert, cutting the rack in half if necessary. Cover and cook on low until the meat is tender, but still intact. About 8 hours.

When ribs are almost cooked prepare the grill for high heat. Place ribs on grill and cook until a nice char is formed. Coat with BBQ sauce

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
